### TECH TALK

Last month, I announced that I would report about the FireBee Atari clone. The FireBee is a modern TOS-compatible computer that was created in Europe through Medusa Computer Systems in Switzerland.

The FireBee is powered by a 264 MHz Motorola Coldfire CPU. It has 512 MB of DDR SDRAM with 8 MB of FLASH ROM for the operating system. It has a Altera Cyclone III FPGA to reproduce all Atari custom chips.

The FPGA also reproduces the Yamaha YM2149 and the WD1772 chips as well. The FPGA has 128 MB of DDR RAM with 512 KB of static RAM. It uses DVI-I for the monitor, but you can get an adapter for VGA as well.

The FireBee also have five USB 2.0 ports and has 10/100 Ethernet and a high-speed serial port. for data storage, it uses SD card and CompactFlash up to 16 GB of storage capacity.

If you are looking for a modern Atari computer that can run your Atari software, then this is a great buy. However, you might have to wait. They are sold out and you need to go on a waiting list to get your FireBee.

Be prepared to spend at least \$600.00 for a barebones FireBee computer, and that is without the case for it. You would get the motherboard solely. However, if you want everything, it is close to \$800.00 for everything included.

### ATARI HOME PLATFORM GAMES REVIEW

I was playing the A7800 version of Rampage recently. It is a fun translation of the classic arcade game. You can play George the giant gorilla, Lizzie the giant lizard, and Ralph the giant wolf.

The rules are simple. Destroy everything in sight in every major US city. Eat humans, fruit, and toast, but do not eat anything else, like poison, cactuses, TVs, and bathtubs. Watch out, though. The military is ready to shoot on sight!

They have soldiers, helicopters, tanks, police cars, all ready to shoot first and ask questions later! If you lose all of your energy, you will revert to your human self. But, continue fast, or you can be lunch as a human by your friends!

For an A7800 game, it reproduces the arcade version quite accurately. It looks cuter than the arcade, but it is 8-bit, so it is OK. The graphics look really good and I like the game play. A destined classic, play this game and you will not go wrong!

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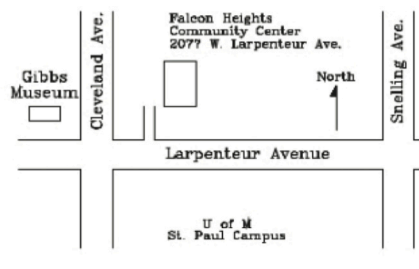
