PrintPower from HiTech Expressions

Last month I talked to you about Award
Ware from the same folks, and gave you
some recommendations about that
product. Since then, I've gotten their
latest PrintShop like product called

PrintPower (which I misnamed last time as Print It). Well, the price being reasonable, plus an offer for free stuff with this one convinced me to try it. The free offer included a graphics disk for Award Ware, which I am eagerly awaiting. Incidentally, PrintPower allows using an Award Ware graphics disk, but not vice versa.

The most important thing to remember about this product is that the disks are enhanced density. This isn't a surprise - it does say on the package that a 1050 drive is required. I don't feel good using enhanced density on my old 1050's (clunky sounding ones), but I also don't like ATARI versions of software with only half the graphics available to other brands, so I am not complaining. Again, the files are all DOS compatible, and the disks (trere are 2 - 1 program, 1 graphics) are not copy protected, so you are encouraged to make backups for your use. It takes advantage of 2 drive systems, and the second drive does not have to be drive

PrintPower capabilities compete with PrintShop. It makes cards, signs, stationary and banners using a variety of borders, graphics and character sets. Since I don't own PrintShop (can you believe that? - maybe it is too easy to use), this is not a comparison. Some features of PrintPower follow. The program is fairly menu driven, with choices windowed, and selectable by positioning a cursor, or single keystroke entries. The manual is generic, with ATARI specific keys defined on a separate insert. Border and picture graphics are shown on a handy reference sheet. There are 40 borders. 60 pictures and 7 alphabets. The pictures are of nice resolution (probably a quarter of a G.8 screen). Borders are also quite nice, and many have special effects in the corners which add to the results. Borders can be 1/2 or 1-inch. and can be all around, top, bottom, top

& bottom, L. R. L & R (or none!). Picture graphics can generally be placed in a variety of places on the document, and can be printed in 4 sizes. Smaller sizes can be put onto a document in several non overlapping positions. The picture placement works like this: once you've picked the picture, a box of appropriate size is displayed on the image of the current work area of the document. Pressing the arrow keys moves this box to available positions, and pressing the SPACE bar sets it down (or lifts it off if it was set). When set, the area becomes shaded. You can only set it another time if you can move the box completely off graphics already set down. (I think you get the picture). If you change your mind, you can undo choices using ESC. This works up to a point - once you have finished a work area (such as one side of a card), the program advances to the next work area and you can't get back. There is an edit existing document option when you have gone through all selections which is nice. It appears each work area is saved to a disk file. You don't have a choice of file name, but 5 default files are setup to hold info about 5 different work areas. A 1 character file named LASTOBJ keeps track of these files. You can save these files (A.G8A thru E.G8A on the program disk) to another disk or with a different name to save more than one document (that's why DOS files are so nice!).

Well, let's have a look at text. Along with the 7 character sets, many special effects are available with each. You can choose bold, italic, jazz (layered), outline, raised, and shadow. Each line of text has separate effects selection. In addition, you can mix fonts (on different lines), sizes, and justification (left, center or right), and mask or unmask when placing text over graphics. Quite enough power here - there is even a HELP screen, although a mite hard to understand until you have become somewhat familiar it. There is a nice

default to all this, so you can produce results without knowing much about these. Text entry generally proceeds as follows: You type to a work window, and an indication of results go to the displayed output image. There isn't an indication of maximum line length until its exceeded (text color on the line changes from white to brown). The program won't allow you to advance to another line until you correct this. Each line is ended with RETURN, and the arrow keys allow you to move around to edit any lines.

So it goes for each area of a document (a card can have four separate work areas). But the bottom line of all this is printing, and after all is said and done, you tell it to do just that. But don't hold your breath for the printer to start - there is much to do before that. And if you don't have anything better to do, just watch the action on the screen. The more features selected, the longer the show. However, once printing starts, it goes to the end without further delays - that's kind of impressive.

One quick note about banners ves, you can do banners, and they can have borders, graphics, and multiple lines of text. Now, more notes about the overall package. Again, many printer types are supported, with setup done once and saved to disk. You can make your working copy and leave off the many small files unique to the different printers. Speaking of making working copies. I split both the program and graphic disks onto both sides of 2 single density disks. The program files lend themselves to having the functionallity for making cards, signs and stationary on one side, and those for banners on the other. The file used for converting Award Ware format graphics disks to PrintPower format wasn't put on either as this would be seldom used. The graphics files could also be split quite nicely. The graphics pictures directory identifies graphics to files, so I

created new directory files for the 2 sides of the new disk, each with about half of the graphics files. All borders and alphabets fit on the remainder of the one side, and all borders and all but one alphabet fit on the other. Wouldn't a double density drive work nice here ?! All of this is great fun for us amateur hackers, one of the finer uses for these products for some of us. You must be getting the idea by now that I feel this ain't too bad a deal in today's market of ATARI software. And since you can use Award Ware graphics, and you have a way of using your own graphics for that package (see last month's article), that capability is available to PrintPower with its adapt function. How can you go wrona?

We will have the ARC, deARC programs there and some examples of ARCed code to show how this works if anyone will need to see it. There should also be terminal programs. Then, thinking ahead to May, bring your thoughts about what utilities you may want to have shown. Remember, members make the meetings (or is it 'many mumbling mice make mightnight music - mighty nice'?)

1. The meeting was called to order

- 2. Treasurer's Report by Bob Siede. February income was \$317.25 and expenses \$308.92 leaving a balance of \$336.18.
- 3. Vice President's Report by John Novotny. John reviewed last month's demos and asked for member input on what they would like to see demoed at future meetings.
- 4. Atari Fair. Larry introduced Tom Green, President of TAIG. Tom announced that preliminary plans were underway for a joint club sponsorship of an Atari Fair in August.
- 5. Offers and Deals. Joe Danko passed a DAK catalog around pointing out a 1200 baud Hayes-compatible modem for only \$79. It was reported

that Best Byte in the Little Canada mall had Atari software for 50% off. A Computer Direct ad was shown offering a variety of Atari software at 3 for \$10. Larry reviewed Wizard Works discount policy for members. S/W in stock or specially ordered without demos or advice sells for 30% off for cash, 25% off for check or charge card, ST H/W is 22% off for cash, 17% off for cash or charge. Epson printers are 30% off for cash, 25% off for check or charge. If you ask for advice or demos the discount is 10% on any purchase. Joe Danko asked for pooled orders for some great utility programs for \$13 called "The 8 Bit Basic Programmers Pal". The Roseville BEST store was reported to be selling the basic A cartridge for \$10.


6. Service and Problems. In response to the question if it is possible to use one power supply to power more than one device, it was decided that it would not work unless a type of isolation transformer was used. Atari is offering to exchange broken 600's and 800's for reconditioned 800XL's for \$50 and similarly exchange broken 810's for 1050's for \$75. Wizard Works will help you do this.

7. DOM. Joe Danko demoed the new DOM menu with many helpful features. He also demoed the programs which covered a side and a half. Joe also announced that revised Text Pro 2.5 with some really versatile capabilities was avilable for sale tonight. He also alerted everyone who plans on using his SynCalc tax template to check the SPACE BB for an important correction.

SPACE Disk of the Month - 4/88

Before discussing the April DOM I
would like to go over a few disks that
were offered last month with no warning



in the news letter. I have been working with the shareware text editor. TEXTPRO, for some time and managed to get it into a more usable form in time for the March meeting. The SPACE library has had previous versions available but we wanted to offer disks. that were simpler and more versatile. TEXTPRO is a powerful text editing system that has the same look and feel as SPEEDSCRIPT from COMPUTE!. The authors took off from there and added a lot of unique features. What sets it apart from everything else for the ATARI 8-bit is a built-in MACRO language that is only limited by the user's imagination and patience. TEXTPRO will not replace full-featured word processors such as ATARIWRITER, PAPERCLIP or WRIT-ERS TOOL but is a good choice where you need to process text in a DOS environment. TEXTPRO is offered by the SPACE library in several versions:

TEXTPRO 1.2 - the original, needs more support files but has the largest text buffer.

TEXTPRO 2.5r - starts higher in memory to allow for resident handlers for communications, etc. All of the features are built in to the main program with no need for support files. This is a revised disk with more features and we will exchange for your old 2.5r disk and \$1.

TEXTPRO 3.2r - same as 2.5r but tailored to run with SPARTADOS.

Any of the versions offered will run by itself but the complete set of three provides a number of files not included on any one version. All versions of TEXTPRO will run with any DOS except MYDOS. They are designed to run with ramdisks and will operate best in an expanded memory, ramdisk environment. The new 2.5r disk and the 3.2r disks include a shareware SPELLING CHECKER system and a bunch of small DOC files to help explain how to use the many features, an improved self-starting MACRO/HELP file structure, and one

442 sector DOC file formatted to copy direct from disk to your printer or screen.

The SPACE SOFTWARE LIBRARY has a lot more than DOM's. Along with TEXTPRO and modem programs we have specialized disks for education, business, mathamatics, childrens stories, PRINT SHOP icons and a lot more.

This month the theme is communications, so the LIBRARY will have for sale the following modem programs: 1030 EXPRESS 2.1/850 EXPRESS 3.0 - all on one disk. Included will be some new handlers for the SX212 which are untested by us.

KERMIT-65 - a new version of KERMIT for ATARI 8-bit recently ported from COMMODORE. As far as I know, it only works with 850/PR. It features 3 screen modes, ATARI, 40 column sidescrolling 80, and a nice 80 column.

DETERM - a new terminal program that is supposed to work with all ATARI modem systems. As this goes to press I am still trying to get it to work, so stay tuned.

AMODEM 7.5x - I am still working on this one, too. The versions and handlers are changing so fast I can't keep up with them all. Apparently, the release of the SX212 has caused a flurry of activity amongst the AMODEM hackers.

I could use some help in the future with testing these modem programs because I don't have a 1030 that works anymore or an XM301 or an SX212.

At the April SPACE meeting we will attempt to DEMO modern software and I will show as many of the different programs as possible.

NERM.BAS - All I'm going to tell you is to plug in a joystick and push in the NORTH direction when it asks if you are ready.

BLAKJAK.BAS - I know, I know, not another blackjack game!!! This one supports going DOUBLE and INSUR-ANCE bets. It has nice graphics, too.

SIMPASM.BAS - so you always wanted to write a little machine language routine to USR from BASIC. This BASIC program will help you do that. All input is in HEXIDECIMAL. Keyin END to stop. Some good reading on assembly language is in back issues of ANALOG in the BOOTCAMP columns and COMPUTE! BOOKS has a good publication on 6502 machine language. Take a look in the PAPER LIBRARY.

PLFIX.BAS - you will need this if you want to run ATARI PLANETARIUM from your US DOUBLER modified 1050 disk drive.

Mast Meeting Minutes

The March meeting of MAST was opened by Vice President Phil Seifert. After some general announcements, President Jim Schulz described the 19 March disks of the month. In addition to the usual fine assortment of public domain material, MAST now has disks from the magazines ANALOG and STLOG available. Read Jim's article for a description of these disks. After the DOM descriptions there was a informal treasurer's report by Phil: MAST has about \$500 in its account.

The News and Rumors section of the meeting included some of the following items: the Magic Sac with Translator 1 is now available at local dealers. John Stanley reported that he had just received a copy of AZTEC "C". Dave Meile reported on a new language for the ST called "NOVA" that was writted by local authors, Dave also reported on the updates available to those who have purchased TACKLE-BOX ST a set of utilities for those who program in PERSONAL PASCAL. ZOOMRACKS is being upgraded to ZOOMRACKS II and ZOOMRACKS III is being developed. Dave Meile is preparing another MAST NEWSDISK which will probably be ready by the next meeting and will cost only \$2. Also available are a set of newsletters written in Holland. Jim Schulz reported that Atari is concentrating its marketing in Europe because of the low value of the dollar. A program called ST TURBO is going to be available that speeds up the test handling ability of the ST (doubles STWRITER's text handling speed), it will sell for \$49.95. The Hannover computer show featured MEGA ST's and laser printers. MEGA ST's are being shipped with a new version of BASIC. Dave Meile reported on a new word processing program called "WORD UP" that has many advanced features (fonts, including MAC fonts, footnotes, graphics, etc.).

The software demonstrations followed the formal MAST meeting with demos of SPACEQUEST, Universal Item Selector, Kisterm, Microsoft Write, Magic SAC and PC Ditto.

CeBIT88 Highlights Hannover, Germany

Reported by -C. J. Purcell I had the priviledge of attending the Hannover Computor Exhibition while working(at our exhibit). The major impression of the CeBIT fair is shear physical size of the facilities and quantity of exhibitors, the second impression is the constant downpour creating a sea of mud and the third reaction is the number of visitors to the ATARI booth at the far end of the fairgrounds.

The major entrance to CeBIT contained IBM, Nixdorf, DEC, Commodore and many other exhitors, as well as our exhibit. At almost all times however, an airplane with a long streaming ATARI banner circled the grounds. Other visual hazards included stationary ballons for NEC, Canon and so forth. Covered passages lead from building one through 3, 4, 5, 6 and finally building 7 which contained the ATARI booth as well as another very large IBM exhibit. Enroute hazards

included Apple, NEC, Canon, more Nixdorf as well as innumerable exhibitors from Taiwan, Hong Kong, Canada, England, France, Italy and of course, the United States.

Another set of covered passages led one thru building one to 2, 18, 17 13, 14 and 15 where I could find all the workstation vendors like SUN, Apollo, IRIS, Sony as well as some of my competition, but not all. On just two occasions did I have the time to make one grand covered circle thru all the goodies. I certainly did not see even ten percent of the goodies at that. What I did see was mostly Intel based 286 and 386 PC's and MC 68020 based workstations with very little ATARI attachments nor ATARI based software for the benefit of MAST clubmembers.

The story is a lot different at the ATARI booth. There some 40 MEGA-ST computers were installed in several clusters mostly manned by invited independent developers of ATARI attachments and ATARI software. These products were quite tame and very expensive with the \$0.67 German Mark. ICD had a flat-pack disk system for the MEGA-ST(say hello to Phil!). Various German technical magazine publishers(C'T, ST-Computer, 68000er-STMagazin) surrounded the ATARI booth providing an enclosure for all the crowds at the ATARI booth.

The day before the show is press conference day when I did see the boss himself, Jack Tramiel, at the regular's table in the inner sanctum. He made the news in Germany by critising the U.S. government policies on DRAM volume pricing decisions. On Thursday I did see the ATARI designer Shiraz M. Shivji at the C'T booth, shook his hand and wished him well (private thoughts re his chances if he battles with Jack Tramiel.....).

Finally, on Sunday when the crowds at the ATARI booth slimmed down, I asked about the ATARI 68030

prototype. Where was it located, could it be seen, etc. Well the prototype was right at the show, just upstairs, in a private room. After some consultation, I was allowed to see the system, and even touch it, with the careful guidance of the resident representative of the UNIX porting vendor, UNISOFT. This particular prototype was the software prototye, not the design style prototype. The system consisted of a 14 inch (MIRO?)monitor operating in mono mode, a VT220 type keyboard and an AT type CPU box with both a 30 Megabyte fixed Hard Disk and a 30 Megabyte removable Hard Disk, but no floopies. The design intent is to use this assembly in any of 3 modes, standalone UNIX. workstation UNIX and/or as a computational server to a MEGA-ST front end(the so-called TwinTurbo TT mode). Autoboot of the system revealed an MSDOS type dialog, eventually to give way to a (bourne)shell prompt. The UNISOFT porting rep. said that the goal is to install System 5 "REAL SOON NOW", as soon as the compiler vendor finishes preparation of the 68030 version of the compiler.(I wonder if the compiler vendor was/is Microsoft since the installed system seemed to be Xenix?). At any rate the demonstrated software and the UNIX tools used only the MC 68020 instruction set.

Otherwise I was attracted to the Sony NEWS workstation with a pair of 68030's as well as a 68882, UNIX, X-Windows, a CDC 268 Megabyte Disk and 1.44 megabyte type floppy disks. If Sony downscales this system, then ATARI will have to look very carefully at the TT strategy.

The new Apollo 10000 workstation was not shown but certainly should be examined with care when information is available. I also saw an interesting prototype on press conference day which I recall was named the micro 1000. It was about one cubic foot, had lots of hype, and could not be

found during the remaining eight days that I looked.

One other prototype which could have substantial utility in a TT mode was shown daily. This system is based on a tower configuration with a 68020/68881, two floppy disks and a hard disk; informatation is to be forwarded if and when available to Americans(ha,ha).

At the January meeting of MAST, I made up a survey and asked the members present to give us their views on how MAST was doing. The survey was divided up into three parts. The first part asked about the user in general. The second part asked about the hardware the user was using. The third part involved answering a number of questions about the strengths and weaknesses of MAST. These surveys were offered for two months to get the opinions of all who were willing to fill it out. The following is the results of the first two sections of the survey. We will examine MAST's strengths and weaknesses next month.

Of all of the surveys handed out, 27 surveys were returned with 26 filled in and one left blank.

Length an ST User: Here I asked, how long have you owned your ST? 1 divided the years up into 6 categories. Here are the results:

Up To 6 Months - 3 7 - 12 Months - 5 13 - 18 Months - 4 19 - 24 Months - 9 25 - 30 Months - 3 Over 30 Months - 0 No Answer - 2

MAST Member: Are you a MAST Member? Here again, I got pretty much what I expected.

Yes - 23 No - 2 No Answer - 1

So what does this first part tell us about the MAST membership??? Well, the common MAST member is male, under 40, has computer experience with more than likely an 8 bit Atari, and has owned for about 1 1/2 to 2 years.

Now onto part two..... Here, we

answer the question of what do all of the MAST members have????

ST Computer: What ST computer do you have? Here are the results:

> 520ST - 5 520ST Upgraded - 8 1040ST - 14

ST Disk Drive: What type of ST disk drive do you have? Here, I counted the disk drive of the largest type (i.e. if you had a single-sided drive and a doublesided drive so I only counted the double-sided drive). I counted all 5.25" drives.

Single-sided - 8 Double-sided - 19 5.25" - 2

ST Monitors: Which monitors do you have? Here are the results:

Color - 22 Monochrome - 10 Monochrome Only - 4

Modems: Do you have a modem and what speed? Here are the results:

Yes - 18 1200 - 14 2400 - 4 No

Printers: Do you have a printer, what type and is it Epson-compatible? Here. the printers were mostly Epson printers with 15 out of the 26, along with 4 Canon Inkjet printers. Here are the other results:

> Yes - 26 - N Epson Compatible - 22

Hard Drives: Do you have a hard drive and what type? The hard drives were all Supras, except for one home-made and all of the Supra were 20 megs, except one. Here are the other results:

Yes - 9 No - 26

Midi Keyboards: Do you have a Midi Keyboard and what type? The results were very surprising.

Yes - 2 No - 24 So what about part two??? Most MAST members have at least 1 meg of memory, a double-sided drive, a color monitor, a modem, and an Epsoncompatible printer.

In conclusion, what does this all say about MAST???? Let's look First, MAST is a dynamic group continually adding new members over the last two years and having a wide range of experience. Second, most MAST members know something about computers, but their knowledge is at least initially limited by their use of only 8 bit Ataris, Apple IIs and Commodores. Third, Midi keyboards are often talked about being used, but they are not popular among MAST members. Fourth, modems are popular, but not all members are using modems and 2400 baud modems have not yet caught on among members. Fifth, Epson printers are the most ST compatible printers for the ST and MAST seem to like them the best. Canon color inkiets are also popular from the sale on them about a year ago and Mindtool's printer dump program. Sixth, many members still have single-sided drives, but they also have a double-sided drive as well. Single-sided DOMs are still the best way to continue for all to benefit. Lastly, monochrome monitors are used by many members, but most also have a color monitor as well.
